



Convoy No. 80 in Kafr El-Jazira Village in Zefta District on Thursday, June 24, 2021

Under patronage Prof. Mahmoud Zaki, Tanta University President, and Prof. Emad Etman, University Vice President for Community Service and Environmental Development, the Sector of Community Service and Environmental Development at Tanta University organized a comprehensive medical and environmental convoy in Kafr El-Jazira village in Zefta district on Thursday, June 24, 2021 under the umbrella of the presidential initiative *Decent Life* that aims to make sustainable development in Egyptian rural areas to help the neediest citizens. The convoy was organized in cooperation with executive bodies in Gharbia governorate namely Education Directorate and Health Directorate.
